# 2024 Changes

Check here for a quick guide to the changes that have happened since the 2023 Wyoming State Fair. We will include major rule changes, new divisions and classes, and any classes that have been taken out.

### GENERAL

 New order of premium book--check for updated page numbers throughout.

## YOUTH LIVESTOCK

- This year, Wyoming State Fair, with its Board of Directors, is pleased to announce that placements will be awarded for the TOP FIVE OVERALL, and the TOP FIVE IN EACH BREED for MARKET beef, swine, sheep, and goats.
- Livestock barns will be closed at night from curfew (10:30 PM) until 5:00 AM.
- Youth Horse exhibitors no longer need to qualify to enter and ride in performance classes at WSF. All youth horse classes are open to any bona fide, eligible Wyoming 4-H or FFA exhibitor who has exhibited in their respective and most recent county fair.
- Youth Sheep will use weight cards to declare weight. See Youth Sheep on page 45 for more info.
- Pygmy and Fiber Goats have been removed from the Youth Goat section. If there are any of these animals wishing to exhibit, they may be entered the appropriate age class in the breeding or meat goat divisions.
- Percentage Boer Bucks have been added to the Youth Breeding Meat Goat Show. See page 35.
- Starting in 2025, no horned goats will be allowed in the market classes. Please plan accordingly for next year's projects.

## **OPEN LIVESTOCK**

- All Open Beef departments except Maine Anjou will take entries via ShoWorks. All entry fees for Angus, Hereford, AORB, and Texas Longhorn will be sent to WSF. All shows (except Maine Anjou) will have an entry deadline of July 24th (via online or mail, postmarked). Most shows will accept late entries with an additional fee. See Open Beef department starting on page 81 for exact fees and late entry deadlines.
- The Performance Lamb contest is taking a hiatus for 2024 but will be back for 2025.


## **OPEN STATIC**

- New Divisions! In Visual Arts: AI Assisted Art; in Crafted Arts: Diamond Painting; in Culinary: Sourdough Bread. See each department section for available classes, entry fees, and guidelines.
- In all Open Static Departments, "junior" classes have been renamed "youth" classes. See each department for age breakouts.
- Needlework entries are due by SATURDAY, AUGUST 10, at 6 PM. Entries will be accepted at the Upper Ag Hall starting Friday, August 9 at 10 AM. Judging will happen on SUNDAY, AUGUST 11, and the exhibit will open on Tuesday with all other exhibit halls. No other static department will accept entries on Friday.

- New guidelines for the Hobby Collections division. See page 98 for more information.
- Needlework has added a class for non-judged (display only) Quilts of Valor. Please indicate if your Quilt of Valor is being entered in the judged class or the non-judged class.
- Edible Landscape entries (under Gardening) are now due by AUGUST 1 (end of day). The exhibitor and the landscape must reside in Wyoming. Photos must be submitted in JPEG or JPG format with attached written files for the descriptions, or as a PDF with written description included in the PDF file. Entries should be able to be easily printed and collated.
- Farm Toy Collection is no longer dually listed under Hobby Collections and Antique Machinery. It is only listed under Hobby Collections division in Crafted Arts.
- New guidelines for awarding individual and troop sweepstakes awards for Scouting. See page 100 for more information.
- Sheep Lead premiums have changed to more accurately reflect class divisions. See page 93 for the current premium schedules and awards.

## **EXHIBITOR OFFICE**

 New service times for the Exhibitor Office on Monday. ONLY FFAAdvisors/4-H Educators will be able to pick up credential on Monday from 8:00 AM to 1:00 PM. The office will then open for the general public. Tuesday - Friday will be open to all, 8:00 AM to 5:00 PM as needed.

# Wyoming State Fair and Rodeo **2024 ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS**

Based on the September 2022 board directive, the WSF will defer to the Wyoming State Veterinarian (who is under the authority of the Wyoming Livestock Board) for guidelines on Certificates of Veterinary Inspections (CVI) and brand inspections. Exhibitors should be prepared to show ownership documentation upon request. Animals traveling from outside Wyoming are required to meet the rules for interstate travel. For further information, please refer to the Wyoming Livestock Board website, wlsb.state.wy.us/public, email lsbforms-applications@wyo.gov, or call 307.777.7515.

## ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

A completed Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) listing individual animal official identification must accompany all livestock exhibiting at the Wyoming State Fair. The CVI must be issued by an accredited veterinarian within 30 days of entry.

- Electronic CVIs will be accepted.
- Both electronic and paper CVIs must be readily available upon request. Wyoming Livestock Board (WLSB) veterinarians will be checking CVIs and potentially inspecting every animal.
- All livestock entering the grounds may be subject to inspection by WLSB veterinarians upon entry or throughout the fair.
- Animals with active ringworm lesions or warts easily visible without close examination are not permitted to exhibit.
- Any animal showing evidence of infectious, contagious, or communicable disease may be immediately removed from the grounds and held in isolation until further testing is completed or released to the owner's premises.

## BRAND INSPECTION REQUIREMENTS

A brand inspection is required on all cattle, horses, mules, and sheep moving intrastate across a county line prior to entry. A brand inspection is also required on all cattle, horses, mules, and sheep leaving the Wyoming State Fair and Rodeo moving intrastate across a county line or interstate leaving the State of Wyoming. Documents need to be presented for inspection at time of animal health check-in.

## WASTE REMOVAL PARTNERSHIP

You and the Wyoming State Fair have the responsibility to have refuse disposed of in an appropriate manner.

All animal, feed, and bedding waste material from the State Fair goes to a recycling site to be composted. We need your assistance in the recycling efforts. Please keep your animal, feed, and bedding waste separated from your regular man-made garbage. It is the responsibility of each Exhibitor to keep stalls, pens, and/or exhibit areas clean and neat. In order to keep the barns in presentable order for guests, we ask the following of you:

- Have stalls cleaned and refuse material placed in the designated sites before 8:00 PM each evening. - After 9:00 AM, all refuse is to be removed to the nearest designated refuse container

# Youth Shows

## YOUTH SHOWS POLICIES AND PROCEDURES Alpaca - Cattle - Goats - Horses - Poultry- Rabbits - Sheep - Swine Wool - FFA - 4-H

- 1. Wyoming State Fair Management reserves the right to interpret all rules and arbitrarily settle all differences and questions not adequately addressed in this guide.
- 2. Rules and Regulations. Compliance with *General Rules and Regulations* apply. It is the responsibility of each exhibitor to be familiar with all applicable rules and regulations. Read on page 9.
- 3. Health and Animal Welfare. All animals must meet Livestock Health and Welfare Requirements. Read on page 11.
- 4. Exhibitor Responsibility. Wyoming State Fair will not be responsible for losses, injuries, or mishaps that may befall animals during the show. Reasonable precautions will be taken to prevent losses or injuries.
- Exhibitor Eligibility. Bona fide Wyoming 4-H and Wyoming FFA members in good standing are eligible to enter and participate as a representative of their respective county 4-H program or FFA chapter. Youth must have exhibited/shown at their respective and most recent county fair.
   Separate 4-H and FFA Animal Entries. Per the June 2021 MOU between UWE 4-H and the Wyoming FFA Association, any

youth enrolled in both organizations must identify each static exhibit or animal entered for competition as being a unique outcome of their FFA SAE or their 4-H project and enter the correct classes/divisions endorsed by the applicable organization.

- 6. Entry Process. Entries are completed by the members' respective FFA Advisor or 4-H Educator. Read on page 9.
- 7. Ownership. All livestock must be owned by the individual member by the following dates:

#### Market Beef - February 1 Horses/Dogs - May 1 Market Lambs, Swine, Goats, Poultry - June 1 Meat Rabbits - 80-day rule All Other Youth Livestock - June 1

- 8. Tagging/Identification. All MARKET animals shown must be properly tagged with an approved 15-digit RFID ear tag. Market animals not having the proper RFID tags in place will not be eligible to show. Tag must match tag recoreded at tagging by FFA/4-H/county and submitted by the tagging deadlines established (Beef- Feb 24, all other species- June 24).
- 9. All youth animal exhibits for beef, goats, swine, and sheep are required to remain on exhibit for the duration of fair. Animals must arrive by 5:00 PM on Monday prior to fair and will be released on Sunday starting at 8:00 AM following fair.
- 10. Youth Animal Fitting Policy: Exhibitors must be present for and actively participate in the fitting of their animals. In the interest of safety and education, an exhibitor may be assisted at the Wyoming State Fair in the fitting of their animal. Assistance is defined as a learning opportunity where the person doing the assisting is educating the youth exhibitor on the technique of ethical fitting as outlined within the premium book. Anyone found in violation of this rule may be subject to immediate disqualification or removal from the fairgrounds by State Fair Management. Unethical Fitting at the Wyoming State Fair is defined as: the injection, use, or administration of any drug that is prohibited by Federal, State, or Local Law, or any drug that is used in a manner prohibited by Federal, State or Local Law; the injection or internal or external administration, use, or application of any drug or feed additive affecting the central nervous system; the administration of diuretics for cosmetic purposes; tissue manipulation, removal, surgical attachment, or otherwise to change, conceal, enhance, or transform the true conformation or configuration or configuration of the animal; attaching to the hide foreign objects including hair/wool or hair/wool substitutes, cloth, or fiber; any physical or physiological attempt to alter the natural musculature or weight by use of injections or ingested material not conducive to the continued health or marketability of beef, sheep, swine, or goat carcasses. Maintaining the integrity of the meat derived from the livestock exhibited at the Wyoming State Fair is the primary reason for the policies and procedures. Most of the market animals shown at the WSF were previously shown and sold before entry to the WSF. Exhibitors have a moral and ethical responsibility to produce meat that will be safe for the consuming public.
- **11. Stalling/Pens.** All Youth show animals must be housed in the designated Youth section, unless given special written permission by the Youth Livestock Superintendent of the species in question, in cooperation and agreement with the applicable Open Show Superintendent.
- 12. Bedding. There is no bedding provided. Exhibitors must provide their own bedding. Read page 11.
- Livestock Trailers. No livestock trailers can be parked on the grounds without proper permits displayed on the trailer. Complimentary
  permits are provided to each FFA Advisor and 4-H Educator based on their number of WSF registered livestock exhibitors. See
  page 9.
- **14. Feed Delivery Vehicles.** Complimentary permits are provided to each FFA Advisor and 4-H Educator based on their number of WSF registered livestock exhibitors. See page 9.
- 15. Blocking Chutes, Trim Tables, Fitting Stands, and Fans. All livestock fans must be suspended. No fans attached to a cart or dolly. No butt fans. No fans in pedestrian walkways. Fans or equipment in use by exhibitors that is deemed to be obstructing safety or space, needed pen space, or facility operations will be requested to be removed by State Fair management. Safety guidelines, as set by the Wyoming State Fire Marshal, must prevail.
- 16. Judges/Judging. All judges' decisions are final. No person shall be permitted to judge a class in which he/she may be competing for an award or have ownership of any animal or article entered in such class. Judges are earnestly requested to familiarize themselves with the Rules & Regulations of this show. If any exhibitor interferes with the judges in the performance of their duties by letter, act, or otherwise, he/she shall be excused from competition and exhibition for such period as Management may determine and shall forfeit any awards received at this fair. Any person not an exhibitor who interferes with the judges in any manner during the performance of duties shall be asked to leave the judging arena.

**Unsportsmanlike Conduct.** Unsportsmanlike conduct will not be tolerated, and offending exhibitors may forfeit awards and premiums, be dismissed immediately from the fairgrounds, and/or lose future eligibility at the Wyoming State Fair. This is considered a violation of the *National Code of Show Ring Ethics*. Read pages 11-12.

- 17. Reporting Violations. Witnessed violations of the Youth Show Rules should be reported to an adult to then be addressed as follows:
  - 1. To the FFA Advisor or 4-H Educator of the member whose entry is involved.
  - 2. If the situation is not resolved, report to the state organizational leadership of the member. (State 4-H Coordinator or State FFA Advisor)
  - 3. If the situation is not resolved, report to a member of the WSF Youth Show Committee to review.
  - 4. If the situation might need legal attention, an appeal can be made through the WSF formal protest process only after steps 1-3 have been followed.
- 18. Protests. All formal protests from the Youth Livestock Show must be made by a current Youth Livestock Show exhibitor and must be submitted in writing, be signed by the Youth exhibitor(s), and be accompanied by \$100 cash or certified check (fee refunded if protest is sustained). The protest must plainly state the cause of the complaint or appeal and must be delivered to the State Fair Director immediately after the occasion for the protest. A protest pertaining to eligibility is most suitable when submitted prior to judging. No complaint or appeal that a judge overlooked an entry will be considered. Judging procedures will not be interrupted for protest investigation. Depending on the basis of the protest, interested parties may be notified and given the opportunity to submit evidence. A decision may be withheld until a complete investigation can be made.
- 19. Suggestions/Comments. Any person or group is encouraged to offer constructive comments and/or provide recommendations to improve the Wyoming State Fair Youth Livestock Show experience, to benefit all Wyoming youth show participants, at the present time and for the future. Comments may be made by visiting www.wystatefair.com.

## GENERAL YOUTH LIVESTOCK POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

- 1. All Youth livestock entries are to be made online via ShoWorks from the county level. Entry deadline is Friday, August 9, 2024 (11:59 PM) for youth horse show, and 6:00 PM, Saturday, August 10, 2024 for all other youth entries.
- 2. All Youth Show exhibitors must have medical release forms from their respective youth organization.
- 3. Each FFA or 4-H exhibitor in this department is required to pay a processing fee as a condition toward application for entry. Processing fees are established as follows: \$20.00 per head for beef cattle (breeding, market, feeder calf, and cow/calf pair); \$15.00 per equine (halter and performance); \$10.00 per head for all alpaca, sheep (breeding and market), swine (breeding and market), and all goats; \$3.00 per rabbit; \$3.00 per bird (poultry); and \$3.00 per wool fleece. This fee shall be paid for every animal registered for exhibit, even if said animal is not ultimately show.

These fees are to be paid in full (or a club/school voucher submitted to WSF) by the deadline of 8:00 PM, Monday, August 12, 2024. If fees are not paid in full, the exhibitor(s) will either forfeit the right to compete in the 2024 Wyoming State Fair or must pay a late processing fee of \$50 per county and/or chapter to be accepted.

4. Based on the board directive in September of 2022, the WSF will defer to the State Vets for guidelines on CVIs and Brand Inspections. For information regarding Certificates of Veterinary Inspection and brand inspections, please refer to the State Vet guidelines available at https://wlsb.state.wy.us/public.

When a question arises concerning the health of any animal exhibited on the fairgrounds, the Show Superintendent shall consult with the State Fair Veterinarian and recommend an action to the Fair Management. Said animal may be dismissed or guarantined, if necessary.

All livestock brought to the Wyoming State Fair must be accompanied by a current brand inspection, when applicable.

- 5. NOTICE: Advisors and/or Agents making entry for the Youth Livestock Show are to figure animal head count/stall/pen needs accurately and properly, especially in the case where facilities have specified limits for space allowed per county and/or chapter. Those individual counties/chapters who exceed allocation shall be fined \$100.00 and the processing fees for the upcoming (next State Fair) year shall double (i.e., \$10.00 sheep fee goes to \$20.00) for all youth livestock shows. No exceptions. Honesty and integrity are the guide.
- 6. During official class judging, only the exhibitor will be allowed in the show ring. In case of exhibitor sickness or other emergency, an animal may be shown by a substitute exhibitor, providing the substitute is a bona fide Wyoming 4-H or FFA member, and the Show Superintendent grants permission in writing and is recorded in advance of the show for an animal class. In Showmanship Classes, exhibitors must show their own animal.
- 7. Youth exhibitors are encouraged to enter Open Class shows. Online entries close July 24th, but most shows will accept late entries. Please see each Open show for details on fees and deadlines. Youth sheep exhibitors must enter the Open Sheep Show by 6:00 PM Thursday, August 15. Please note registration paper requirements for Open Class Entries. Original registration papers, or photocopies thereof, must be presented for all animals entered in classes so requiring. Absolutely no "appiled for" registrations will be accepted.
- 8. Wyoming State Fair Management encourages Youth Show exhibitors to wear 4-H or FFA emblems while exhibiting.
- 9. In case the total department premiums exceed the established premium budget, premiums will be scaled down as designated by State Fair Management to meet budget.
  - In the case where no donor is designated, there will be no special award presented.
- 10. If a Premier Exhibitor award is given, it is based upon total points won by an exhibitor in the division. First place ribbons count as 5 points, second place ribbons count for 3 points, and third place ribbons count for 1 point. All other placements are 0 points.
- 11. There will be no dogs allowed in the Livestock Barns. Please review the guidelines and policy for dogs in the front of this book.
- 12. Each Youth member having livestock for show is required to keep their display area clean and have the stalls orderly at all times. Failure to do so may result in forfeiture of premiums and/or awards.
- 13. Herdsmanship is an important component of the youth show, and youth groups not meeting minimal daily herdsmanship requirments may forfeit awards/premiums from the show. Stall cards are to be completed and on display for the duration of the fair.

# **ANIMAL DRUG TESTING**

The Wyoming State Fair will continue drug testing Market Swine, Beef, Goats and Sheep. For these market species, drug testing will be mandatory for the top five placement winners and randomly selected market animals from each species



At the Wyoming State Fair we value education, animal welfare, protecting the food chain, and fostering fair competition. Drug testing is a valuable tool to help exhibitors and families to understand the possible implications of using substances on their animal.



By 5 PM on Tuesday (opening day) of the Wyoming State Fair, exhibitors must turn in a Quality Assurance Certificate and Statement of Disclosure (Drug Declaration) form for each animal to the Exhibitor Office drop box. These forms can be found at wystatefair.com or picked up at the Exhibitor Office.

## **GRANDS & RESERVES**

Sample collection will take place immediately following the judge's selection by Jordy Drug Testing, or a State Fair Representative, and a parent, guardian, or witness over the age of eighteen for the exhibitor will escort the animal to the secured area and remain with the animal until a sample has been successfully collected, sealed and signed by Jordy Drug Testing and the exhibitor's adult representative (or the exhibitor if 18 or older). Chain of custody best practices shall be followed. Buckles will be presented ringside and used for photos, then held at the Wyoming State Fair office until the test results have come back negative or are deemed excusable by the review panel. Exhibitors will receive a letter informing them of the results of the test and, if negative or excusable, their buckles and premiums.

## RANDOM TESTS

Prior to animals entering the show ring, a class and placement will be announced that will be required to do a random drug test. Immediately after judging, Jordy Drug Testing, or a State Fair Representative, and a parent, guardian, or witness over the age of eighteen for the exhibitor will escort the animal to a secured area and remain with the animal until a sample has been successfully collected, sealed and signed by Jordy Drug Testing and the exhibitor's adult representative (or the exhibitor if 18 or older). Chain of custody best practices shall be followed. Exhibitors will receive a letter informing them of the results of the test and, if negative or excusable, their premiums.

CONSEQUENCES FOR POSITIVE TESTS

Upon receiving a positive test result from Texas A&M, a review panel will determine whether the result is excusable, and if inexcusable, the consequences for the exhibitor. The determination made by the review panel is final and not eligible for protest.

In the event of a positive test, the Wyoming State Fair will notify the exhibitor of the positive test and of the opportunity to contest the results by (1) requesting a test of the split sample, (2) providing written explanation and supporting documents for why the animal had a positive drug test result, or (3) both. The selection of the laboratory, or choice of laboratories, to be used for the testing of any split samples shall be determined by the Wyoming State Fair. The exhibitor is solely responsible for all costs associated with the testing of their animal's split sample. If an exhibitor elects to contest, the exhibitor must, within 15 days of receiving notice of the positive test result: (1) submit a written request for a test of the split sample along with proof that the exhibitor has paid the selected laboratory all costs associated with the test; (2) submit written explanation and supporting documents, if any, for why the animal had a positive drug test result; or (3) both. If the exhibitor fails to do either of the above, within the time provided, the exhibitor waives any right to contest.

To determine whether the original results are inexcusable and if consequences are warranted, the review panel will review the original drug test results, the split sample test results, if applicable, and any documents submitted by the exhibitor. If the review panel deems the original positive test inexcusable, the exhibitor will foreit premiums and awards for the animal that tested positive.

Additionally, consequences for an inexcusable positive test may range from a 1-3 year probation period to a 1-3 year suspension period. During a probation period, the exhibitor's market livestock exhibits must be drug tested upon arrival at the Wyoming State Fairgrounds. The exhibitor will be responsible for drug testing fees during the probation period. During a suspension period, the exhibitor will not be permitted to show during the Wyoming State Fair.

In the case of a positive test resulting in disqualification, placements will not advance up.

# YOUTH HOUSING-DORMITORIES

To help youth exhibitors be able to attend the fair and participate in competetions, the fair provides the use of dormitory-style housing on grounds for the benefit of youth exhibitors.

## FACILITIES

- 1. The fair dormitories have bunk beds, foam mattresses, showers and lavatories. The female dormitory also has clothes racks.
- 2. All youth and adult chaperones staying in the dormitories must provide their own bedding (sheets, pillows, pillow cases, and blankets), towels, soap, personal hygiene items, clothes hangers and any other personal belongings as needed.
- 3. Individuals are responsible for all personal belongings.

## ELIGIBILITY

- 1. Only bona fide 4-H and FFA youth contestants who are participants in contests or educational activities during the State Fair, along with official adults serving as dormitory chaperones, are eligible to stay in youth housing.
- If space is available, Extension Educators, Agricultural Education (FFA) Advisors, and other designated chapter/county adult leaders may be allowed to stay in youth housing.
- 3. Children under eight years of age <u>will not</u> be allowed to stay in the dormitories.

## COSTS

- 1. Dormitory use fees are \$60.00 per full week (Sunday through Sunday).
- 2. No single day rates will be available.
- 3. Each individual who stays in a dormitory is required to pay the \$60.00 usage fee.
- Dormitories will be available for occupancy on Sunday, August 11 at 3:00 PM and will close on Sunday, August 18 at 10:00 AM.

## REGISTRATION

- 1. Processes specific to each youth organization will be utilized.
  - a) For FFA DORMS, see pages 57-58, #8-12 and contact Stacy Broda.
  - b) For 4-H DORMS, see page 64, #2 and contact Mandy Marney or the State 4-H office.
- 2. It is the responsibility of the FFA or 4-H personnel to verify the arrival of the youth members named on the housing registration.

## PRIVILEGES

- 1. Youth having dormitory privileges are required to abide by established policies and cooperate with fair and dormitory management for the enjoyment and benefit of all involved.
- Advisors, agents, and adult chaperones are responsible and accountable for the conduct of their youth delegation as well as designated chaperones at all times.
- 3. Individual or group violators of policies, deadlines, or other established guides for conduct will face disciplinary and/or legal action.
- 4. For safety reasons: Each individual staying in the dormitory will be required to have proper identification easily visible at all times for access to the dormitories.

## PETS

 There will be no pets or animals of any type allowed in the dormitories; exception for written requests for service dogs for those individuals with sight or hearing impairment.

## HOURS

- 1. All youth and adults staying in the dorm shall be in by 10:30 PM each evening or at the designated curfew time as posted by the Wyoming State Fair and the youth programs involved.
- 2. Adult chaperones are responsible to ensure that each and all members of their delegation are in prior to the evening deadline.
- 3. Violations of the established curfew time will cause the individual violator to automatically lose their dormitory use and other fairtime privileges for the current fair. The violator will be required to find alternative housing off the fairgrounds, or will be requested to leave the fairgrounds for the duration of the current fair, or will have parents called to pick them up the following morning to be taken home for the duration of the current fair.

## FORBIDDEN

- 1. Possession or use of alcohol or illegal substances on grounds is absolutely forbidden. Any youth participant, exhibitor, or adult chaperone identified with such substances shall automatically lose the privilege and earned right to represent their FFA Chapter or County 4-H program at State Fair and will immediately be sent home. There will be zero tolerance for alcohol or illegal substance use while involved with the Wyoming State Fair and/or being in the dormitories or on the fairgrounds. Legal action may be pursued for violations.
- 2. There shall be no tobacco use inside the dormitories at any time. Violators will be warned the first time, with a second violation resulting in automatic loss of dormitory use.



- 1. Each youth participant and designated adult chaperone is covered by accident and health insurance by their individual youth organization.
- Individuals requiring medical assistance are required to contact the head chaperone of the dormitory or contact the administrative office of the participant youth organization: Fort Caspar for 4-H and Fort Laramie for FFA

## RESPONSIBILITY

1. The Wyoming State Fair assumes no responsibility for the loss of property, accident, or illness from utilizing dormitory space at the State Fair.

## DORMITORY PARKING

## COMPLIMENTARY PARKING

 The Wyoming State Fair provides complimentary parking passes to one designated AEI or CEA from each participating chapter and county. The number of individual vehicle parking passes provided is based upon the number of registered exhibitors/contestants staying in the dormitories from each chapter or county delegation. Delegations having passenger buses will be provided one complimentary parking pass per bus.

2. Vehicles not having the proper parking credentials (designated pass) properly displayed or not properly parked in the designated lot may cause the vehicle pass to be revoked. Please use the parking passes in the proper manner and only in the designated locations. ## FEED AND BEDDING/EQUIPMENT TRAILERS

- 1. There are to be no trailers parked on grounds (inside fenced areas) for 2024. The State Fair will designate allocated space for youth livestock support trailers.
- 2. The trailers are to have a current permit displayed on the trailer for ease of visibility.
- Complimentary trailer permits and feed delivery vehicle passes will be provided to one designated AEI or CEA for each chapter and/or county. The number of permits provided being based on the number of registered youth livestock exhibitors from each chapter and/or county.
- 4. Additional feed delivery vehicle passes may be purchased for \$60.00 each by the designated AEI or CEA.
- Feed delivery vehicles may only be used during the designated hours of 5:00 AM to 9:00 AM and 5:00 PM to 9:00 PM. Violators will lose their feed delivery permit(s).
- 6. Trailers not having the proper permit displayed or not parked in the proper location will be notified and all county or chapter premiums will be withheld until proper corrections are taken in a timely manner. Chapters or counties not abiding by the designated allocation of permit spaces will automatically forfeit their feed trailer allocation space(s) for the next year.
- All other livestock trucks and trailers are to be parked in the south end of the Pepsi Lot, west of Brownfield Road. (There are to be no livestock trailers parked in other locations on the grounds.)

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## GENERAL 4-H INFORMATION & 4-H Policies

- 1. All Wyoming 4-H members in good standing in their respective county programs are eligible to compete or enter exhibits in the 4-H Department's Shows, Divisions and Classes.
- 2. Dormitories: The Wyoming State Fair offers a housing opportunity to all 4-H members and designated county 4-H adult chaperone participants. No one will be permitted to stay in the 4-H section of the dormitories without appropriate credentials. Each county is assigned beds in the 4-H section of the dormitories. The head 4-H dorm chaperones will be in charge at all times.
- **3. Credentials**: Wristbands, season meal tickets, season pins/passes, and feed trailer passes will be issued to UW Extension Educators ONLY for their 4-H county youth participants. None will be issued to youth or their families directly. NOTE: Wristbands will be required for all 4-H youth participants.
- **4. Conduct:** Every 4-H member and 4-H adult volunteer or chaperone signed an agreement outlining behavior expectations. While participating as a 4-H member or volunteer, that Code of Conduct or agreement is in effect.
- 5. The use of alcohol, tobacco, and illegal drugs is prohibited at all 4-H events or activities. This applies to the 4-H section of the dormitories. Any 4-H member or 4-H adult chaperone that possesses or that has consumed alcohol or illegal drugs may be sent home. This can result in the forfeit of all awards, premiums and trips. Additional disciplinary actions may be taken at the discretion of the county 4-H program under the direction of the UW County Extension Educator.
- 6. Medical Emergencies and Health Forms In the case of a medical emergency, seek immediate attention from medical professionals either by calling 911 or via the First Aid Station on the grounds of the State Fair. After immediate attention is addressed, please contact your UW County Extension Educator or the State 4-H Office (Ft. Caspar).

- 7. Grievances: Any protests must be submitted in writing and accompanied by \$50 check or cash to the State 4-H Office (Ft. Caspar). If the protest is granted, the check/cash will be refunded to the owner. The protest must be filed at least 12 hours before the completion/judging begins or within 12 hours after the end of the competition/judging. The matter will be addressed by staff from the State 4-H Office.
- 8. Per the June 2021 MOU between UWE 4-H and the Wyoming FFA Association, any youth enrolled in both organizations must identify each static exhibit or animal entered for competition as being a unique outcome of their FFA SAE or their 4-H project and enter the correct classes/divisions endorsed by the applicable organization.
- 9. Due to the absence of interview judging at the state fair, the accompaniment of a brief explanation with your project may help the judge when assigning a ribbon placing. Points to consider may include: process, tools used, skills learned, goals achieved, additional help from others.

- 1. General Youth Livestock Policies and Procedures apply to this division as well as those rules listed below.
- 2. The "Household Pet" cat is of mixed breed or unknown descent.
- 3. A purebred cat is one belonging to a recognized breed with characteristics maintained through generations of unmixed descent; may be registered with a recognized registry.
- 4. Kittens must be at least 4 months old and not older than 8 months of age. Adult cats are older than 8 months of age. Because of susceptibility to disease, no kitten under 4 months of age will be accepted for competition.
- 5. No pregnant or nursing cats may be entered.
- 6. All cats and kittens must have their claws clipped. Declawed cats may enter the show and will not be counted down for declawing.
- 7. Do not enter your cat if you feel it will not be easily handled by the judge.
- 8. Each cat or kitten must be wearing a harness or collar (not a safety collar) and a leash. The exhibitor must always wear the leash on their wrist for safety reasons.
- Exhibitors must furnish their own carpet square during judging. Exhibitors must provide a proper cage or carrier for their cats/kittens. Exhibitors must bring their own litter and litter box.
- 10. All exhibitors should wear long sleeve shirts or blouses with trousers or skirts. No shorts.

## **HEALTH REQUIREMENTS**

- All cats must be accompanied by a current rabies vaccination certificate, stating that the animal has been vaccinated by a veterinarian in accordance with current recommendations of the Compendium of Animal Rabies Control as prepared by the National Association of State Public Health Veterinarians (NASPHV). It is strongly suggested, but not mandatory, that all entries have the combination vaccinations, plus feline leukemia. Vaccinations should not be received within three weeks prior to the show.
- Cats found to be ill or with parasites (fleas, ear mites, etc.) will not be allowed to show and will be dismissed from the grounds. No cat or kitten should enter if there are any (feline) infectious or contagious diseases in the household within three weeks prior to the show date.

- General Youth Livestock Policies and Procedures apply to this division as well as those rules listed below.
- 4-H members qualify to enter the State 4-H Dog Show by competing in their county 4-H Dog Show AND:
  - a) Showmanship Member and dog competed in County 4-H Dog Show.
  - b) Obedience Received a qualifying score of 170 or above. Members must compete at the same level in the state 4-H Dog Show that they qualified for at the country level.
  - c) Conformation Recieved a qualifying score of 70 or above. Members must compete at the same level in the State 4-H Dog Show that they qualified for at the county level.
  - d) Agility and Rally Recieved a qualifying score of 75 or above. Members must compete at the same level in the State 4-H Dog Show that they qualified for at the county level.
  - e) All dogs must be at least 6 months of age by May 1st to compete at the State 4-H Dog Show and 1 year of age by May 1st for agility classes.
- 3. All dog entries must be accompanied by an official health certificate by a veterinarian. *No animals will be allowed at the Wyoming State Fair without a valid Animal Health Certificate.*
- 4. Dogs participating in the 4-H program should follow their veterinarian's recommendations for infectious disease vaccinations. At minimum, they should be current on vaccination for Rabies, Distemper, Parvo, and have recieved a Bordetella (kennel cough) vaccination within the last 12 months.
- 5. Vicious dogs will be dismissed from the ring and must be removed from the premises.
- 6. Females in season will be allowed in classes. However, they will go through at the end of all classes.
- 7. Spayed, monorchid, and neutered dogs may be shown without judging discrimination.
- 8. The show committee reserves the right to ask anyone violating these rules to leave.
- 9. No class will be held up for a contestant in a different State Fair Show.
- Entries for Rally classes and Agility classes will need a current Wyoming 4-H Jump Height card at check-in to verify correct class entries.

**SECTION 2- OBEDIENCE** 

- A4-H member may compete in only one obedience class per dog with a total maximum of two entries (dogs). Their first dog is referred to as the "A" dog. The other is referred to as the "B" dog for class entries.
- 2. The First Year Beginner Novice Class is for members who are in their first year of the dog project, not the first year with a new dog. It is designed as a training class for members who do not feel competent to start in the On Leash class. Members may compete in the First Year Beginner Novice class only once.
- 3. A 4-H exhibitor with a dog shown previously in obedience classes by another 4-H member, or a dog that has a title from another organization or has three qualifying scores from the designated annual county 4-H show, must show the dog by these guidelines:
  - a) Junior and Intermediate exhibitors may move back or down one level.
  - b) Senior age exhibitors must show the dog at the highest level the dog has achieved.
- 4. A dog receiving a qualifying score of at least 170 points at the designated annual county fair may advance the following year to the next higher class but must advance after receiving 3 qualifying scores from the designated annual county 4-H show. Once the higher level of obedience is selected for the dog, the member may not drop back to the lower level with the same dog.
- 5. High in trial will be calculated on the basis of the raw qualifying score plus five additional points with each increase in level of difficulty.
- Score Sheets: The Wyoming 4-H dog score sheets were designed for the benefit of 4-H members. They are intended as guides for judges. Judges use their discretion in deciding the seriousness of errors.
- 7. All dogs must enter/leave the show ring and compete with a leash.
- 8. Bait and/or toys are not allowed in obedience competition.
- 9. Dogs soiling or urinating in the ring during judging will be disqualified and receive no score.
- Males and females will be shown in the same class. Females in heat will be shown last in the class and must be kept away from the obedience ring until call time.



- Exhibitors entering more than one dog in any class may be assisted only by another 4-H member (from the same county, if possible) if the dogs must be shown at the same time.
- Classes 12-19 will be judged according to AKC standards, but it is not necessary that dogs be registered; they must be purebred - both animal parents of the same breed.
- Classes 20 and 21 are for cross-bred dogs parents of different breeds - and will be judged according to the predominant breed characteristics and/or soundness, gait, condition, and grooming.

- 1. Dogs must be at least one year of age by May 1st.
- State entrants must achieve qualifying scores at their county level before competing in the State 4-H Dog Show. The level at which a member qualifies at the county level is the level in which they will compete at the State 4-H Dog Show.
- 3. A dog receiving a qualifying score of at least 75 points at County 4-H Show may advance the following year to the next higher class but must advance after receiving 3 qualifying scores from the designated County 4-H Show. Once the higher level in agility is selected for the dog, the member may not drop back to the lower level with the same dog.
- 4. Youth, with a dog shown in previous years by another 4-H member or a dog that has a standard agility title from another organization, or has received 3 qualifying scores from the designated annual County 4-H Show, must show the dog under these guidelines:
  - a) Junior and Intermediate 4-H youth may move back/ down one level.
  - b) Senior 4-H youth must show the dog at the highest level the dog has achieved.
- 5. All dogs must enter and leave the ring on leash.
- 6. Level 1 dogs will run on a leash. Level 2 dogs must run off leash or with a tab no longer than 6 inches. Collars must be of a flat, buckle variety with nothing hanging from them such as tags.
- 7. Bait is not allowed in Agility competition.
- 8. Dogs in season will run at the end of each class.
- A time for all handlers (only) to familiarize themselves with the course they are competing in will be established and announced.

#### **SECTION 5- RALLY**

- Eligible entries are identified and entered by each county 4-H Educator.
- 2. A dog can be entered in only one rally class.
- Entries must achieve qualifying scores at their county level before competing in the State 4-H Dog Show. The level at which a member qualifies at the county level is the level in which they will compete at the State 4-H Dog Show.
- A dog must advance levels after receiving 3 qualifying scores except for the RAE. Once a level is selected for the dog, the member may not drop to a lower level to compete with that dog. RAE class is indefinitely.
- 5. Dogs soiling in the ring will be disqualified.
- 6. All dogs must enter and leave the ring on leash. Those competing in On Leash classes should do so with a 6-foot leash.
- 7. Collars may be flat buckle (leather or nylon) or choke chains.
- 8. No bait (dog treats or toys) is allowed in the ring.
- Rally Advanced Excellent (RAE) Class only- Participation ribbons will be given in the Advanced and Excellent classes regardless of qualifying score. If qualifying scores are received in both classes, then placement ribbons will be given.

#### 10. Classes are based on age of the youth and the experience of the dog and include:

- a) Novice Dog: A dog competing which has not obtained three qualifying scores from competitions nor has a Rally title from an other organization.
- b) Pre-Advanced Dog: A dog which has received three qualifying scores as a Novice Dog but has not earned a qualifying score as an Advanced Dog.
- c) Advanced Dog: A dog which has received three qualifying scores from competitions, received a score at least 70 points in a Novice Dog class, or that has a Rally title from another organization.
- d) Excellent Dog: A dog which has received three qualifying scores from competition, received a score of at least 70 points in an Advanced Dog class, or that has a Rally title from another organization.
- e) Rally Advanced Excellent (RAE): After receiving three qualifying scores from competitions, the handler and dog move up to this level. At this level the handler and dog will compete in both Advanced Dog and Excellent Dog classes at the same show. The handler and dog must earn a qualifying score of 70 in each of the classes (Advanced and Excellent) to earn ribbons and or prizes. Handler and dog may show at this level indefinitely.

# 4-H Exhibits

- Entries must have been exhibited at the respective county fair and have been designated eligible for state fair entry.
- 2. The Wyoming State Fair, State 4-H Office, and UW County Extension Educators or staff are not responsible for the loss of or damage to any exhibit or animal.
- 3. It is the responsibility of 4-H youth to verify correct entry of their exhibits with their 4-H Educator.
- 4. Due to the absence of interview judging at the State Fair, the accompaniment of a brief explanation with your project may help the judge when assigning a ribbon placing. Points to consider may include: process, tools used, skills learned, goals achieved, additional help from others.
- Because 4-H promotes a learning experience associated with project enrollment, entries are evaluated within the context of the division in which they are entered, i.e. entry in Leathercraft is evaluated on leathercraft skills.
- 6. Posters, pictures, artwork and photography exhibits should come with a method for hanging them on hooks attached to pegboard. If the items cannot be hung, they will be displayed on the floor or table.
- 7. Display boards or poster boards must be able to stand on their own on a table.
- Any exhibit that puts the safety of others at risk of injury or harm, as deemed by the State 4-H Office, may not be allowed to be publicly displayed and/or judged.
- 9. Oversized exhibits will be displayed as space permits.
- 10. 4-H exhibits are placed as judged using the Danish system of recognition (purple, blue, red, white). Additional awards or recognition are available pending donor support.
- 11. All static exhibits must be in place in the 4-H Department by 5:00 PM on Monday, August 12.



Showmanship is about teamwork, an important life skill, where the youth and animal learn to work together and demonstrate their hard work for a judge.
