2026 Changes

Check here for a quick guide to the changes that have happened since the 2025 Wyoming State Fair. We will include significant schedule changes, major policy or requirement changes, new divisions and classes, and any classes that have been taken out.

SCHEDULE CHANGES

- The Youth Sheep barn will not open until 12:00 PM on Sunday, August 9 for set-up.
- Youth Horse entries are due at 6:00 PM on Friday along with all other youth livestock entries.
- Youth Horse: Monday Indoor area schedule will no longer run concurrently (split arena). Instead, show order will be FFA showmanship followed by 4-H showmanship followed by Halter Geldings and concluding with Halter Mares.
- The King Arthur Baking Contest will be held on Friday evening and not Saturday this year. See Culinary for details.

YOUTH LIVESTOCK

- Health forms must be obtained from the vet within 14 days of the animal's arrival on grounds (previously 30 days). All animals for an exhibitor may be listed on the same form. Please have your health forms ready when you arrive on grounds as they will be checked before you are able to unload.
- All animals except poultry and rabbits need a health form. Poultry and rabbits will continue to have on-site health checks prior to their respective shows.
- Registration papers are no longer required for the Youth Breeding Sheep show. Youth Sheep exhibitors planning on entering the Open Sheep Show should have copies of registration papers or be prepared to enter into the commercial classes.
- Youth Breeding Sheep with still have fitted and slick shorn classes, however, there will only be one champion for each breed (fitted and slick shorn breed champions will compete against each other).
- Youth Market Sheep exhibitors who lose their classification card between classification and turning in for weight declaration will automatically be put into the Crossbreed class.
- Youth Meat Breeding Goat Does in the Junior age group (born Sep 1, 2025 to present) will be broken into classes by weight. Senior Meat Breeding Does will continue to break out by age. See page ___ for classes. Junior does will need to weigh with the Market Goats on Tuesday. See schedule for time.
- Youth Breeding Swine will no longer be split by age. Instead, they will be split by weight. Weight cards will be due at the same time as for Market Swine.

OPEN LIVESTOCK

- The Performance Lamb contest will not be returning this year.

YOUTH STATIC

- New classes have been added to FFA Ag Mechanics and Classroom. See pages 50-54 for details.

OPEN STATIC

- Culinary classes have changed! Be sure to review each division so you know where your entries fit best. Check out the new spotlight classes that highlight fun flavor combos and challenges!
- NEW THIS YEAR: Best Crumbl-Inspired Cookie (Culinary), House Plant Collection (Gardening), ZZ Plant (Gardening), Propagation Station Yearlings (Gardening), America the Beautiful (Natural Fiber Arts), Red, White & Blue Hand-dyed Colorway (Natural Fiber Arts), Red, White & True (Theme Quilt, Needlework), Paint the Fair (Visual Arts), and America Unscripted (Visual Arts). See each department for more info.
- Crafted Arts has several combined/rearranged classes in gourd art, mosaics, paper crafting and garden decor. See page 77-80 for more info.
- The Little Rock Village class has updated guidelines for board size and village size.
- Wyoming State Fair Cookie Jar contest no longer requires the jar to be filled with cookies (Culinary). There are also classes for both adults and youth.
- Updated guidelines and age division for the Table Setting Contest (Culinary). The theme has also been removed, so use all your creativity!
- Several cut flower and potted plant varieties have had classes combined. Check your favorite to know the best class to enter your exhibit (Gardening).
- Natural Fiber Arts Garments have new class breakouts.
- Classes & Divisions we said goodbye to: Best Display (Culinary)--this is replaced by Best of Show awards throughout the department; Canned Meat (Culinary); Cut flowers: balsam, clarkia, dianthus (Gardening); Potted Pepper Plants (Gardening)
- Update to the Overall Premier Exhibitor contest: this contest can only be won once every three(3) years. See page 76 for more details.

SPECIAL CONTEST OPPORTUNITIES

- To help celebrate America's 250th birthday, we will have a special contest, "She's a Grand Old Flag" where exhibitors can enter their best American flag inspired artwork. Exhibits that have been previously entered into the Wyoming State Fair are eligible to be entered in this contest only. Check the website for details. Entries will be accepted in the Crafted Arts department at normal processing times.
- Calling all cake bakers & decorators--join us for the first annual Cowboy State Cake Showdown! This special contest is a joint venture with the Wyoming State Fair Foundation, and will pit 10 teams against each other on both best tasting cake (public tasting and voting) as well as cake decoration (live, on-site). Watch the website for details and how to enter. You may just win the Golden Fork AND the Golden Tier award!

2026 Wyoming State Fair and Rodeo ROADMAP FOR FIRST TIME YOUTH EXHIBITORS

Exhibiting at the Wyoming State Fair is an exciting opportunity to showcase your hard work, make new friends, and gain valuable experience. Here's what you need to know:

GETTING STARTED

Eligibility Youth must be enrolled in 4-H (through ZSuite) or FFA in Wyoming to enter Youth Show Livestock competitions and 4-H/ FFA static competitions. All youth, regardless of club/chapter activity, may enter the Open Classes for both livestock and static, and are encouraged to do so.

County Fair Participation Youth 4-H and FFA Static (non-livestock/indoor) exhibits must qualify at the county level before advancing to State Fair. Livestock exhibitors do not need to qualify at the county level to enter State Fair. The exceptions for livestock are Champion of Champions and FFA Showmanship classes, both of which require qualification at the county level (COC) / chapter level (FFA). Any entry you make into the Open shows need not place at the county level.

Entry Process Livestock and FFA exhibits are entered via ShoWorks; 4-H static exhibits are entered via 4-H. Wyoming State Fair uses Group Entry, meaning 4-H educators/FFA advisors log in and do the entries for their respective groups. Each county may have different procedures for how they accomplish this, so check with your 4-H leader, Extension Educator, or FFA advisor on the process for your county. You, as the exhibitor and parent, will not be able to enter your 4-H/FFA projects into ShoWorks directly, but you can enter your Open projects! Please work with your educator/advisor to ensure you have access to the password that will get all your open projects entered under your same login as your youth projects. This will help ensure all your prizes are included in one check after fair.

Deadlines State Fair entry deadlines must be met. These can be found in the official premium book. The most notable deadlines are listed on page 11 under the General Information. Ownership deadlines are listed on page 19 under Youth Livestock. There are ownership and tagging deadlines, as well as entry deadlines. Talk with your educator/advisor if you are unsure of a deadline.

ADMISSIONS & FEES

Passes Daily or season passes are required for all exhibitors and guests starting Tuesday, August 11. Many educators/advisors will secure passes for the youth exhibitors (and sometimes, for the exhibitor's family) when submitting entries and credentials prior to fair. These passes are given to the educator/advisor and they will distribute them to their exhibitors. Check with your educator/advisor for the process in your county. Additional passes can be purchased for family and friends online or at the ticket booths at the fairgrounds.

Processing/Entry Fees All livestock are charged a processing fee, and there are some additional stock fees for the horse show. All youth fees are typically paid through the club/chapter/school. Each county, club or school may have a different way of collecting these fees from the exhibitor (and some cover all or part of the fees). Get with your educator/advisor to learn what fees you will need to cover and what help they may be able to give. These fees must be paid by the chapter/club/school upon arrival on grounds. Any additional passes, entry fees for Open class, parking, etc, must be paid upon arrival.

PREPARING FOR STATE FAIR

Static Exhibits Most 4-H indoor projects are transported by county Extension Educators. Oversized or fragile items may require personal delivery. Confirm with your county on how they do this.

Livestock Exhibits Some counties work together to transport animals, while many leave that up to individual families. Check with your educator, advisor, and county staff to verify your transportation options. Animals may begin arrival on grounds on Monday, August 10, at 8:00 AM, and must be in place by 5:00 PM that day.

Review the requirements for health certificates, brand inspections, drug declaration forms, breeding papers, and vaccinations. Make sure to bring all appropriate papers, certificates, and documentation with you. Brand paperwork, health certificates, vaccination records can all be digital as long as they are clear and accessible. Drug declaration forms must be a physical copy to turn in. Check show guidelines for breeding paper requirements.

It is a good idea to print out the section of this book that pertains to your species. You can use this as a reference when you get to the fairgrounds, knowing which classes you are in, show times, and the basic entry requirements. Be sure to familiarize yourself with the requirements, policies, and general expectations for fairtime.

Lodging Options There are several different lodging options for youth exhibitors. Both 4-H and FFA exhibitors have the option of staying in the dorms on the fairgrounds. If staying in the dorms, you will need to bring your own bedding and towels. The respective programs provide chaperones. There is also a campground with RV hookups on the fairgrounds if the whole family wants to come. Reservations for these spots open up on July 1st each year and can be made via the website, www.wystatefair.com. There are also several hotels and other camping options in and around Douglas. If needing a hotel, please keep in mind rooms sell out quickly, so book early.

Meals There is a cafeteria available to all exhibitors starting with dinner on Monday night. You can purchase a weekly meal pass or buy meal tickets separately. Your educator/advisor can assist you in pre-purchasing these, but they are also available once you arrive from the Exhibitor's Office. Don't forget there is also the midway and food court, with lots of tasty options. Some spending cash will go a long way!

DURING FAIR WEEK

Arriving Upon arrival, check in with your species superintendent and follow their direction for unloading, stalling, etc. Each species superintendent has an office in the livestock area (either in the barn or nearby) or at the show tent (for walk in shows). Stall cards with contact details must be displayed in the pen for the duration of fair for cattle, goats, sheep, and swine.

Herdsmanship Pens must be cleaned by 9 AM daily. Most counties will have a trailer parked near the barns for storing extra feed and bedding. Work with your county advisors and educators to know when they will have those unlocked during the day. Any additional loading of supplies should happen during loading windows (5:00 AM-9:00 AM and 5:00 PM-9:00 PM daily). Be sure to bring enough bedding & feed to last the week! Limited shavings are available on grounds for purchase.

ROADMAP FOR FIRST TIME YOUTH EXHIBITORS

(continued)

Livestock Showing As a livestock exhibitor, be sure to note when your species needs to be checked in, weighed in (market classes), and classified (market classes). Some species use weight cards that must be turned in, and some have the animals pass over the scales. Check your species pages in the book for these times and locations. It is your responsibility to be present for these activities and turn in the required information on time.

On your show day, be ready to enter the ring when your class is called. Review schedules and listen for announcements. Be on time and exhibit good sportsmanship at all times.

Jackpot Shows The Wyoming Ag Teacher Association (WATA) puts on jackpot shows for each of the four market species (goats, swine, sheep, and cattle). You can enter these when you weigh in (beef and goats) or check in (for sheep and swine). Get with your species superintendent for more details. You will need cash to enter. There is more info in the Youth Livestock section of this book on entry fees and show times.

Have Fun Remember, fair is about celebrating all the things our exhibitors (YOU!) have accomplished over the past year. We hope you enjoy showing off your animals and non-animal projects. Be sure to check out the midway, exhibit halls, shows of other species, and the great entertainment on grounds while you are here!

Exhibits Release Youth livestock exhibits may leave starting Saturday, August 15, at 6:00 PM. Open livestock release times vary and are listed in this book. Statics vary by 4-H/FFA and Open, and times are listed in this book. You are responsible for cleaning the pens/stalls your animals were in before you depart.

AFTER FAIR

Premium Checks If your exhibits earned a monetary prize given by the WSF, known as a premium, a check will be mailed to the address provided on your entry (either online or submitted form for Open). If you had multiple entry files, or if you win a special 4-H award, you may receive more than one check. If you have not seen your premiums by September 30th, please first check with your advisor or educator. If a school or club address was used when they did entries, your check would have been mailed there. If they do not have it, call the WSF office and ask for Sara. The last day to report a missing or inaccurate check is November 1st, 2026.

Any exhibitor earning over \$600 in premiums must fill out a W-9 before the check will be released. If you believe you earned over \$600, please contact Sara in the office to complete your form.

Any exhibitor who has an animal exhibit drug tested will have their premiums held until the results are received and verified that they are negative or excusable.

Plan for Next Year Start thinking about your next project and how you can improve for the following year's competition! The fair will be August 17-21, 2027. We hope to see you and your exhibits there!

LIVESTOCK HEALTH & COMPLIANCE

ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

A completed WSF Health Form, signed by an accredited veterinarian, listing each individual animal's identification, must accompany all livestock exhibiting at the Wyoming State Fair. The Health Form must be signed by an accredited veterinarian within 14 days of entry to the Wyoming State Fairgrounds.

- All animals except poultry and rabbits need a health form. Poultry and rabbits will continue to have on-site health checks prior to their respective shows.
- For youth livestock exhibitors, the WSF health form must be presented before unloading livestock.
- For open livestock exhibitors, please turn in your health form to the species superintendent upon arrival on the fairgrounds and before unloading.
- All livestock entering the grounds may be subject to inspection by WSF veterinarian(s) upon entry and throughout the fair.
- Animals with active ringworm, lesions, or warts easily visible without close examination are not permitted to exhibit.
- Any animal showing evidence of infectious, contagious, or communicable disease may be immediately removed from the grounds and held in isolation until further testing is completed or released to the owner's premises.

BRAND INSPECTION REQUIREMENTS

A brand inspection is required on all cattle, horses, mules, and sheep moving intrastate across a county line prior to entry. A brand inspection is also required on all cattle, horses, mules, and sheep leaving the Wyoming State Fair and Rodeo moving intrastate across a county line or interstate leaving the State of Wyoming. Documents need to be presented for inspection at time of animal health check-in. OUT OF STATE ANIMALS

All animals entering Wyoming for the fair must comply with both the import requirements of the Wyoming Livestock Board and the specific regulations of the Wyoming State Fair. Detailed information is available at: <https://wlsb.state.wy.us/public/brand-inspection>

WASTE REMOVAL

All animal, feed, and bedding waste material from the State Fair goes to a recycling site to be composted. We need your assistance in the recycling efforts. Please keep your animal, feed, and bedding waste separated from your regular man-made garbage. It is the responsibility of each Exhibitor to keep stalls, pens, and/or exhibit areas clean and neat. In order to keep the barns in presentable order for guests, we ask the following of you:

- Have stalls cleaned and refuse material placed in the designated sites before 8:00 PM each evening.
- After 9:00 AM, all refuse is to be removed to the nearest designated refuse container

POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

Youth livestock exhibitors must be familiar with and abide by all of the regulations of the Wyoming State Fair including those in the General Information section.

Eligibility Bona fide Wyoming 4-H and Wyoming FFA members in good standing are eligible to enter and participate as a representative of their respective county 4-H or FFA chapter. Youth must have exhibited or shown at their respective and most recent county fair.

Medical Release Forms All youth show exhibitors must have a completed medical release form from their respective youth organization.

Separate 4-H and FFA Entries Per the June 2021 MOU between UWE 4-H and the Wyoming FFA Association, any youth enrolled in both organizations must identify each static exhibit or animal entered for competition as being a unique outcome of their 4-H project or their FFA Supervised Agriculture Experience and enter the correct classes/divisions endorsed by their applicable organization.

Affiliation The Wyoming State Fair encourages Youth Show exhibitors to wear 4-H or FFA emblems.

Entry Process Entries in any youth livestock, 4-H, and FFA classes are completed by the member's respective 4-H Educator or FFA Advisor.

Youth exhibitors are encouraged to enter Open Class Livestock shows. Exhibitors who wish to enter Open shows must comply with those deadlines, regulations, and pay separate fees. Please see each Open Species show for details. Please note registration paper requirements for Open Class entries. See pages 63-73. Original registration papers or photocopies must be presented for all animals requiring them. Absolutely no 'applied for' registrations will be accepted.

Processing Fee Each 4-H / FFA exhibitor in this department is required to pay a processing fee as a condition toward application for entry. Processing Fees are as follows:

- \$ 20 / head for cattle
- \$ 15 / head for equine (halter and performance)
- \$ 10 / head for Alpaca, Sheep, Swine, Goats
- \$ 3 per rabbit, poultry and wool fleece

This fee is due for every animal entered for exhibit, *even if not ultimately shown*. All fees must be paid in full, a club/school voucher submitted, or invoicing arranged with WSF by Monday of fair week at 8:00 PM. All invoiced amounts must be paid in full by September 30 of the current year.

Ownership All livestock must be owned by the individual member by the following dates of the current year:

- February 1—Market Beef
- May 1—Dogs
- June 1—Market Lamb, Market Swine, Market Goats,
Poultry, Horses, All other youth livestock
- Meat Rabbits—80 day rule

Brand Papers and Health Certificates See Animal Health requirements on page 17.

Tagging/Identification All Market animals must be properly tagged with an approved 15-digit RFID ear tag. Market animals not having the proper RFID tags in place will not be eligible to show. The tag must match the tag that was recorded at the spring tagging by the county, 4-H or FFA, and submitted to the State Fair by the tagging deadlines.

Stalling/Pens All youth show animals must be housed in the dedicated Youth section of the barns, unless given special written permission by the Youth Livestock Superintendent of the species in question, in cooperation and agreement with the applicable Open Show Superintendent.

FFA Advisors/ 4-H Educators making entry in the Youth Livestock Shows are to figure animal head count/stall/pen needs accurately and properly, especially in the case where facilities have specified limits for space allowed per county and/or chapter. Those individual counties/ chapters who over inflate their expected numbers or that exceed their reported numbers shall be fined \$100 and the processing fees for the next year's State Fair shall double (i.e., \$10 sheep fee goes to \$20) for all youth livestock shows. No exceptions. Honesty and integrity are the guide. These are reported on the Credentials & Invoicing Form, due to the Exhibitor's Office by 6:00 PM Friday prior to fair.

All stalling shall be assigned by the superintendents. No one may begin moving into stalls until assignments have been made. Tack stalls may not be claimed or moved into until ALL animals have been stalled, and must be within the assigned county's allocation of stalls. Beef tie-outs will be first come, first serve on Monday, but exhibitors may be asked to tighten up if need dictates. Superintendents will work with Endowment winners on any tack areas that were won.

On Display All youth animal exhibits in beef, goats, swine, and sheep are required to remain on exhibit for the duration of the State Fair. Animals must be in place by 5:00 PM on Monday and will be released starting Saturday night at 6:00 PM.

Bedding No bedding is provided except for initial bedding for cattle. Exhibitors must furnish their own bedding. See page 14 for more info.

Herdsmanship See page 14. Stall cards are to be completed and on display for the duration of fair.

Waste Removal Partnership All animal, feed, and bedding waste material from the State Fair goes to a recycling site to be composted. Please keep animal waste separate from man-made garbage. Have your stalls cleaned and refuse material in designated sites before 9:00 AM. After 9:00 AM all refuse material is to be removed to the nearest refuse container.

Livestock Trailers & Feed Delivery No livestock trailer can be parked on the grounds without proper permits displayed on the trailer. Complimentary trailer permits and feed delivery vehicle passes will be provided to one designated educator/advisor for each chapter and/or county. The number of permits provided is based on the number of registered youth livestock exhibitors from each chapter and/or county from the previous year, as indicated below.

Feed delivery vehicles may only be used during the designated hours of 5:00 AM to 9:00 AM and 5:00 PM to 9:00 PM. Violators will lose their feed delivery permit(s). Additional feed delivery vehicle passes may be purchased for \$100.00 each by the designated educator/advisor at the Exhibitor's Office.

All other livestock trucks and trailers are to be parked in the south end of the Pepsi Lot, west of Brownfield Road. **There are to be no livestock trailers parked in other locations on the grounds.**

Premium trailer parking is available through the WSF Endowment Fund Auction held annually in June.

Blocking Chute, Tables, Fitting Stands, and Fans See page 14.

Youth Fitting Policy Exhibitors must be present for and actively participate in the fitting of their animals. In the interest of safety and education, an exhibitor may be assisted at the Wyoming State Fair in the fitting of their animals. Assistance is defined as a learning opportunity where the person assisting is educating the youth exhibitor on the technique of ethical fitting as outlined within this premium book. Anyone found to be in violation of this policy may be subject to immediate disqualification or removal from the fairground by State Fair Management.

Unethical fitting at the Wyoming State Fair is defined as: the injection, use, or administration of any drug that is prohibited by Federal, State, or Local Law, or any drug that is used in a manner prohibited by Federal, State, or Local Law; the injection or internal or external administration of any product or material, whether gas, solid, or liquid, to an animal that conceals, enhances, or transforms the true conformation, configuration, breed, condition, or age, or by making the animal appear more sound than otherwise would appear; the administration, use, or application of any drug or feed additive affecting the central nervous system; the administration of diuretics for cosmetic purposes; tissue manipulation, removal, surgical attachment, or otherwise to change, conceal, enhance, or transform the true conformation or configuration of the animal; attaching to the hide foreign objects including hair/wool or hair/wool substitutes, cloth, or fiber; any physical or physiological attempt to alter the natural musculature or weight by use of injections or ingested material not conducive to the continued health or marketability of beef, sheep, swine, or goat carcasses.

Maintaining the integrity of the meat derived from the livestock exhibited at the Wyoming State Fair is the primary reason for the policies and procedures. Most of the market animals shown at the WSF were previously shown and sold before entry to the WSF. Exhibitors have a moral and ethical responsibility to produce meat that will be safe for the consuming public.

Exhibitor Participation During official class judging, only the exhibitor will be allowed in the show ring. In case of exhibitor sickness or other emergency, an animal may be shown by a substitute exhibitor, provided the substitute is a bona fide Wyoming 4-H or FFA member and the show Superintendent has been advised in advance of the show of the need and grants permission. In Showmanship classes, exhibitors must show their own animal, and no substitute exhibitor is allowed.

Unsportsmanlike Conduct It is considered a violation of the National Show Ring Code of Ethics to display unsportsmanlike conduct. Such conduct will not be tolerated, and offending exhibitors may forfeit awards and premiums, be dismissed immediately from the fairgrounds, and/or lose future eligibility to exhibit at the Wyoming State Fair.

Reporting Violations Witnessed violations of the Youth Show Policies should be reported to an adult to then be addressed as follows:

1. To the FFA Advisor or 4-H Educator of the member whose entry is involved.
2. If the situation is not resolved, report to the State organizational leadership of the member (State FFA Advisor or State 4-H Coordinator.)
3. If the situation is not resolved, report to a member of the Youth Show Committee to review.

If the situation might need further attention, an appeal can be made through the Wyoming State Fair formal protest policy. See page 16 for the formal policy.

Premier Exhibitor If a Premier Exhibitor award is given, it is based on total points won by an exhibitor in the division. First place placements count as 7 points, second place count as 6 points and third place counts as 5 points, and so on through 7th place with 1 point and all other placements (if awarded) as 0 points. This applies to Youth Livestock Premier awards only.

ANIMAL DRUG TESTING

The Wyoming State Fair will continue drug testing Market Swine, Beef, Goats, and Sheep. For these market species, drug testing will be mandatory for the top five placement winners and randomly selected market animals from each species.

Why At the Wyoming State Fair, we value education, animal welfare, protecting the food chain, and fostering fair competition. Drug testing is a valuable tool to help exhibitors and families to understand the possible implications of using substances on their animal.

Drug Declaration By 5:00 PM on Tuesday of the 2026 Wyoming State Fair, exhibitors MUST turn in their drug declaration forms to the Exhibitor Office drop box. **ONE FORM IS REQUIRED PER MARKET ANIMAL.** Drug Declaration forms can be found in the back of this book, at wystatefair.com, or picked up at the Exhibitor Office. Any exhibitor who does not turn in a declaration form by this time forfeits the right to contest in the case of a positive test. Exhibitors who have animals tested will have the opportunity to provide a secondary declaration at the time of testing to cover anything administered from 5:00 PM Tuesday and their show time.

Top Five Winners Sample collection will occur immediately following the judge's selection. The drug testing liaisons or a State Fair representative, along with a parent, guardian, or designated adult witness (age 18 or older), will escort the animal to a secured area. They will remain with the animal until a sample is successfully collected, sealed, and signed by both the testing liaison and the exhibitor's adult representative (or by the exhibitor, if 18 or older). Chain of custody best practices will be observed throughout the process. Once the WSF receives the test results, exhibitors will be notified by letter of the outcome and, if the results are negative or excusable, will receive their premiums.

Random Tests Prior to animals entering the show ring, a class and placement will be announced that will be required to do a random drug test. Sample collection will take place immediately following the judge's selection. The drug testing liaisons or a State Fair Representative, and a parent, guardian, or witness over the age of eighteen for the exhibitor will escort the animal to the secured area and remain with the animal until a sample has been successfully collected, sealed and signed by the testing liaison and the exhibitor's adult representative (or the exhibitor, if 18 or older). Chain of custody best practices shall be followed. Upon WSF receiving the results, exhibitors will receive a letter informing them of the results of the test and, if negative or excusable, their premiums.

Consequences for Positive Tests Upon receiving a positive test result from the lab, a review panel will determine whether the result is excusable, and if inexcusable, the consequences for the exhibitor. The determination made by the review panel is final and not eligible for protest.

In the event of a positive test, the Wyoming State Fair will notify the exhibitor of the positive test and of the opportunity to contest the results by (1) requesting a test of the split sample, (2) providing written explanation and supporting documents for why the animal had a positive drug test result, or (3) both. The selection of the laboratory, or choice of laboratories, to be used for the testing of any split samples shall be determined by the Wyoming State Fair. The exhibitor is solely responsible for all costs associated with the testing of their animal's split sample. If an exhibitor elects to contest, the exhibitor must, within 7 days of receiving notice of the positive test result: (1) submit a written request for a test of the split sample along with proof that the exhibitor has paid the selected laboratory all costs associated with the test; (2) submit written explanation and supporting documents, if any, for why the animal had a positive drug test result; or (3) both. If the exhibitor fails to do either of the above, within the time provided, the exhibitor waives any right to contest.

To determine whether the original results are inexcusable and if consequences are warranted, the review panel will review the original drug test results, the split sample test results, if applicable, and any documents submitted by the exhibitor. If the review panel deems the original positive test inexcusable, the exhibitor will forfeit premiums and awards for the animal that tested positive.

Additionally, consequences for an inexcusable positive test may range from a 1-3 year probation period to a 1-3 year suspension period. During a probation period, the exhibitor's market livestock exhibits must be drug tested upon arrival at the Wyoming State Fairgrounds. The exhibitor will be responsible for drug testing fees during the probation period. During a suspension period, the exhibitor will not be permitted to show during the Wyoming State Fair.

In the case of a positive test resulting in disqualification, placements will not advance up.

YOUTH HOUSING-DORMITORIES

To help youth exhibitors be able to attend the fair and participate in competitions, the fair provides the use of dormitory-style housing on grounds for the benefit of youth exhibitors.

FACILITIES

1. The fair dormitories have bunk beds, foam mattresses, showers, and lavatories. The female dormitory also has clothes racks.
2. All youth and adult chaperons staying in the dormitories must provide their own bedding (sheets, pillows, pillow cases, and blankets), towels, soap, personal hygiene items, clothes hangers, and any other personal belongings as needed.
3. Individuals are responsible for all personal belongings.

ELIGIBILITY

1. **Only bona fide 4-H and FFA youth contestants who are participants in contests or educational activities during the State Fair, along with official adults serving as dormitory chaperons, are eligible to stay in youth housing.**
2. If space is available, Extension Educators, Agricultural Education (FFA) Advisors, and other designated chapter/county adult leaders may be allowed to stay in youth housing.
3. **Children under eight years of age will not be allowed to stay in the dormitories.**

COSTS

1. **Dormitory use fees are \$60.00 per full week** (Monday through Sunday).
2. No single day rates will be available.
3. Each individual who stays in a dormitory is required to pay the \$60.00 usage fee.
4. Dormitories will be available for occupancy on Monday, August 10 at 3:00 PM and will close on Sunday, August 16 at 10:00 AM.

REGISTRATION

1. Processes specific to each youth organization will be utilized.
 - a) For FFA DORMS, see pages 50-51, #8-12 and contact Stacy Broda.
 - b) For 4-H DORMS, see page 55, #2 and contact Samantha Krieger or the State 4-H office.
2. It is the responsibility of the FFA or 4-H personnel to verify the arrival of the youth members named on the housing registration.

PRIVILEGES

1. **Youth having dormitory privileges are required to abide by established policies and cooperate with fair and dormitory management for the enjoyment and benefit of all involved.**
2. Advisors, agents, and adult chaperons are responsible and accountable for the conduct of their youth delegation as well as designated chaperons at all times.
3. Individual or group violators of policies, deadlines, or other regulations of conduct will face disciplinary and/or legal action.
4. **For safety reasons: Each individual staying in the dormitory will be required to have proper identification easily visible at all times for access to the dormitories.**

PETS

1. **There will be no pets or animals of any type allowed in the dormitories;** exception for written requests for service dogs may be made to the General Manager.

HOURS

1. All youth and adults staying in the dorm shall be in by 10:30 PM each evening or at the designated curfew time as posted by the Wyoming State Fair and the youth programs involved.
2. Adult chaperons are responsible to ensure that each and all members of their delegation are in prior to the evening deadline.
3. Violations of the established curfew time will cause the individual violator to automatically lose their dormitory use and other fairtime privileges for the current fair. The violator will be required to find alternative housing off the fairgrounds, or will be requested to leave the fairgrounds for the duration of the current fair, or will have parents called to pick them up the following morning to be taken home for the duration of the current fair.

FORBIDDEN

1. **Possession or use of alcohol or illegal substances on grounds is absolutely forbidden.** Any youth participant, exhibitor, or adult chaperone identified with such substances shall automatically lose the privilege and earned right to represent their FFA Chapter or County 4-H program at State Fair and will immediately be sent home. Legal action may be pursued for violations.
2. There shall be no tobacco use inside the dormitories at any time. Violators will be warned the first time, with a second violation resulting in automatic loss of dormitory use.

MEDICAL

1. **Each youth participant and designated adult chaperone must be covered by accident and health insurance by their individual youth organization.**
2. Individuals requiring medical assistance are required to contact the head chaperone of the dormitory or contact the administrative office of the participant youth organization: Fort Caspar for 4-H and Fort Laramie for FFA

RESPONSIBILITY

1. The Wyoming State Fair assumes no responsibility for the loss of property, accident, or illness from utilizing dormitory space at the State Fair.

DORMITORY PARKING

COMPLIMENTARY PARKING

1. The Wyoming State Fair provides complimentary parking passes to one designated AEI or CEA from each participating chapter and county extension office. The number of individual vehicle parking passes provided is based upon the number of registered exhibitors/contestants staying in the dormitories from each chapter or county delegation. Delegations having passenger buses will be provided one complimentary parking pass per bus.

GENERAL INFORMATION & POLICIES

- All Wyoming 4-H members in good standing in their respective county programs are eligible to compete or enter exhibits in the 4-H Department's Shows
- Dormitories:** The Wyoming State Fair offers a housing opportunity to all 4-H members and designated county 4-H adult chaperone participants. No one will be permitted to stay in the 4-H section of the dormitories without appropriate credentials. Each county is assigned beds in the 4-H section of the dormitories. The head 4-H dorm chaperones will be in charge at all times.
- Credentials:** Season pins/passes, meal tickets, and parking passes requested through the credentials form will be issued to UW Extension Educators ONLY. None will be issued to youth or their families directly.
- Conduct:** Every 4-H member and 4-H adult volunteer or chaperone signs an agreement outlining behavior expectations. While participating as a 4-H member or volunteer, that Code of Conduct or agreement is in effect.
- The use of alcohol, tobacco, and illegal drugs is prohibited at all 4-H events or activities. This applies to the 4-H section of the dormitories. Any 4-H member or 4-H adult chaperone that possesses or that has consumed alcohol or illegal drugs may be sent home. This can result in the forfeit of all awards, premiums and trips. Additional disciplinary actions may be taken at the discretion of the county 4-H program under the direction of the UW County Extension Educator.
- Medical Emergencies and Health Forms** - In the case of a medical emergency, seek immediate attention from medical professionals either by calling 911 or via the First Aid Station on the grounds. After immediate attention is addressed, please contact your UW County Extension Educator or the State 4-H Office (Ft. Caspar).
- Grievances:** Any protests must be submitted in writing and accompanied by \$50 check or cash to the State 4-H Office (Ft. Caspar). If the protest is granted, the check/cash will be refunded to the owner. The protest must be filed at least 12 hours before the completion/judging begins or within 12 hours after the end of the competition/judging. The matter will be addressed by staff from the State 4-H Office.
- Per the June 2021 MOU between UWE 4-H and the Wyoming FFA Association, any youth enrolled in both organizations must identify each static exhibit or animal entered for competition as being a unique outcome of their FFA SAE or their 4-H project and enter the correct classes/divisions endorsed by the applicable organization.**
- Due to the absence of interview judging at the state fair, the accompaniment of a brief explanation with your project may help the judge when assigning a ribbon placing. Points to consider may include: process, tools used, skills learned, goals achieved, additional help from others.

- General Youth Livestock Policies and Procedures apply to this division as well as those regulations listed below.
- The "Household Pet" cat is of mixed breed or unknown descent.
- A purebred cat is one belonging to a recognized breed with characteristics maintained through generations of unmixed descent; may be registered with a recognized registry.
- Kittens must be at least 4 months old and not older than 8 months of age. Adult cats are older than 8 months of age. Because of susceptibility to disease, no kitten under 4 months of age will be accepted for competition.
- No pregnant or nursing cats may be entered.
- All cats and kittens must have their claws clipped. Declawed cats may enter the show and will not be counted down for declawing.
- Do not enter your cat if you feel it will not be easily handled by the judge.
- Each cat or kitten must be wearing a harness or collar (not a safety collar) and a leash. The exhibitor must always wear the leash on their wrist for safety reasons.
- Exhibitors must furnish their own carpet square during judging. Exhibitors must provide a proper cage or carrier for their cats/kittens. Exhibitors must bring their own litter and litter box.
- All exhibitors should wear long sleeve shirts or blouses with trousers or skirts. No shorts.

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

- All cats must be accompanied by a current rabies vaccination certificate, stating that the animal has been vaccinated by a veterinarian in accordance with current recommendations of the Compendium of Animal Rabies Control as prepared by the National Association of State Public Health Veterinarians (NASPHV). It is strongly suggested, but not mandatory, that all entries have the combination vaccinations, plus feline leukemia. Vaccinations should not be received within three weeks prior to the show.
- Cats found to be ill or with parasites (fleas, ear mites, etc.) will not be allowed to show and will be dismissed from the grounds. No cat or kitten should enter if there are any (feline) infectious or contagious diseases in the household within three weeks prior to the show date.

1. General Youth Livestock Policies and Procedures apply to this division as well as those regulations listed below.
2. All rules and expectations for Wyoming State Fair and other Youth and 4-H Show animal exhibitors will be applicable to the 4-H Dog Show.
3. This show will use the Wyoming 4-H Dog Show Guidelines, available here: <http://tiny.cc/WY4-HDog>. In case of situations of conflicts or a question that arise that are not specifically addressed in the WSF Policies and Procedures or the 4-H Dog Guidelines, American Kennel Club rules and regulations will govern.
4. 4-H members qualify to enter the State 4-H Dog Show by competing in their county 4-H Dog Show AND:
 - a) **Showmanship** - Member and dog competed in County 4-H Dog Show.
 - b) **Obedience** - Received a qualifying score of 170 or above. Members must compete at the same level in the state 4-H Dog Show that they qualified for at the country level.
 - c) **Conformation** - Youth placed in the top 4 at their respective county fair.
 - d) **Agility** - Received a qualifying score of 75 or above. Members must compete at the same level in the

State 4-H Dog Show that they qualified for at the county level.

- e) **Rally** - Received a qualifying score of 70 or above. Members must compete at the same level in the State 4-H Dog Show that they qualified for at the county level.
5. Eligible entries are identified and entered by each county 4-H Educator.
6. All dogs must be at least 6 months of age by May 1st to compete at the State 4-H Dog Show and 1 year of age by May 1st for agility classes.
7. **Dogs participating in the 4-H program should follow their veterinarian's recommendations for infectious disease vaccinations. At minimum, they should be current on vaccination for Rabies, Distemper, Parvo, and have received a Bordetella (kennel cough) vaccination within the last 12 months.**
8. Females in heat will be shown last in their class and must wear pants.

SECTION 1 : DOG SHOWMANSHIP

See Division 1879 - Classes 10 through 12

SECTION 2 - OBEDIENCE

- A 4-H member may compete in only one obedience class per dog with a total maximum of two entries (dogs). Their first dog is referred to as the "A" dog. The other is referred to as the "B" dog for class entries.
- The First Year Beginner Novice Class is for members who are in their first year of the dog project, not the first year with a new dog. It is designed as a training class for members who do not feel competent to start in the On Leash class. Members may compete in the First Year Beginner Novice class only once.
- A 4-H exhibitor with a dog shown previously in obedience classes by another 4-H member, or a dog that has a title from another organization or has three qualifying scores from the designated annual county 4-H show, must show the dog by these guidelines:
 - Junior and Intermediate exhibitors may move back or down one level.
 - Senior age exhibitors must show the dog at the highest level the dog has achieved.
- A dog receiving a qualifying score of at least 170 points at the designated annual county fair may advance the following year to the next higher class but must advance after receiving 3 qualifying scores from the designated annual county 4-H show. Once the higher level of obedience is selected for the dog, the member may not drop back to the lower level with the same dog.
- High in trial must have a minimum score of at least 170 out of 200 plus five (5) additional points with each increase in level of difficulty. First year beginner novices are not eligible for this award.
- Score Sheets: The Wyoming 4-H dog score sheets were designed for the benefit of 4-H members. They are intended as guides for judges. Judges use their discretion in deciding the seriousness of errors.
- All dogs must enter/leave the show ring and compete with a leash.
- Bait and/or toys are not allowed in obedience competition.
- Dogs soiling or urinating in the ring will be disqualified and receive no score.
- Males and females will be shown in the same class. Females in heat will be shown last in the class and must be kept away from the obedience ring until call time.

- All dogs must enter and leave the ring on leash. Those competing in On Leash classes should do so with a 6-foot leash.
- Collars may be flat buckle (leather or nylon) or choke chains.
- Males and females will be shown in the same class. Females in heat will be shown last in their class and must wear pants and must be kept away from the obedience ring until call time.

4. GRADUATE NOVICE A (off leash)- For dogs that have received a novice level obedience title from another organization but have not received an open level obedience title or have at least one qualifying Novice score in 4-H.
5. OPEN A (off leash) - For dogs that have received a novice obedience title from another organization but have not received an open level obedience title or have at least one qualifying Graduate Novice score in 4-H.
6. UTILITY A (off leash) - For dogs that have received an open level obedience title from another organization, or at least one qualifying Open score in 4-H.
7. ON LEASH B
8. NOVICE B (on and off leash) - For dogs that have not received a first level obedience title from another organization.
9. GRADUATE NOVICE B - For dogs that have received a novice obedience title from another organization but have not received an open level obedience title.
10. OPEN B (off leash) - For dogs that have received a novice obedience title from another organization but have not received an open obedience title.
11. UTILITY B (off leash) - For dogs that have received an open level obedience title from another organization.

SECTION 3 - CONFIRMATION

- All dogs must enter and leave the ring on leash.
- Classes will be subdivided by breeds within a class, if numbers warrant. First place winners in classes 12-21 will compete for the Best in Show trophy in Conformation.
- Exhibitors entering more than one dog in any class may be assisted only by another 4-H member (from the same county, if possible) if the dogs must be shown at the same time. 2 dogs max per exhibitor.
- Classes 12-19 will be judged according to AKC standards, but it is not necessary that dogs be registered; they must be purebred - both animal parents of the same breed.
- Classes 20 and 21 are for cross-bred dogs - parents of different breeds - and will be judged according to the predominant breed characteristics and/or soundness, gait, condition, and grooming.

SECTION 4 - AGILITY

- Dogs must be at least one year of age by May 1st.
- State entrants must achieve qualifying scores at their county level before competing in the State 4-H Dog Show. The level at which a member qualifies at the county level is the level in which they will compete at the State 4-H Dog Show.
- A dog receiving a qualifying score of at least 75 points at County 4-H Show may advance the following year to the next higher class but must advance after receiving 3 qualifying scores from the designated County 4-H Show. Once the higher level in agility is selected for the dog, the member may not drop back to the lower level with the same dog.
- Youth, with a dog shown in previous years by another 4-H member or a dog that has a standard agility title from another organization, or has received 3 qualifying scores from the designated annual County 4-H Show, must show the dog under these guidelines:
 - Junior and Intermediate 4-H youth may move back/down one level.
 - Senior 4-H youth must show the dog at the highest level the dog has achieved.
- All dogs must enter and leave the ring on leash.
- Level 1 dogs will run on a leash. Level 2 dogs must run off leash. Collars must be of a flat, buckle variety with nothing hanging from them such as tags.
- In levels 2-7, the handler may take a small toy or treat into the ring. Before the leash is removed at the beginning of the run, the toy or treat must be placed in a pocket so it will not fall out. It may not be removed until the leash is attached at the end of the run.
- Dogs in season will run at the end of each class.
- A time for all handlers (only) to familiarize themselves with the course they are competing in will be established and announced.
- Fastest times will be used to break ties on scores at all levels.

SECTION 5 - RALLY

- Eligible entries are identified and entered by each county 4-H Educator.
- A dog can be entered in only one rally class.
- Entries must achieve qualifying scores at their county level before competing in the State 4-H Dog Show. The level at which a member qualifies at the county level is the level in which they will compete at the State 4-H Dog Show.
- A dog must advance levels after receiving 3 qualifying scores except for the RAE. Once a level is selected for the dog, the member may not drop to a lower level to compete with that dog. RAE class is indefinitely.
- Dogs soiling in the ring will be disqualified.
- All dogs must enter and leave the ring on leash. Those competing in On Leash classes should do so with a 6-foot leash.
- Collars may be flat buckle (leather or nylon) or choke chains.
- No bait (dog treats or toys) is allowed in the ring.
- Rally Advanced Excellent (RAE) Class only- Participation ribbons will be given in the Advanced and Excellent classes regardless of qualifying score. If qualifying scores are received in both classes, then placement ribbons will be given.
- **Classes are based on age of the youth and the experience of the dog and include:**
 - Novice Dog:** A dog competing which has not obtained three qualifying scores from competitions nor has a Rally title from an other organization.
 - Pre-Advanced Dog:** A dog which has received three qualifying scores as a Novice Dog but has not earned a qualifying score as an Advanced Dog.
 - Advanced Dog:** A dog which has received three qualifying scores from competitions, received a score at least 70 points in a Novice Dog class, or that has a Rally title from another organization.
 - Excellent Dog:** A dog which has received three qualifying scores from competition, received a score of at least 70 points in an Advanced Dog class, or that has a Rally title from another organization.
 - Rally Advanced Excellent (RAE):** After receiving three qualifying scores from competitions, the handler and dog move up to this level. At this level the handler and dog will compete in both Advanced Dog and Excellent Dog classes at the same show. The handler and dog must earn a qualifying score of 70 in each of the classes (Advanced and Excellent) to earn ribbons and or prizes. Handler and dog may show at this level indefinitely.

4-H Exhibits

1. Entries must have been exhibited at the respective county fair and have been designated eligible for state fair entry.
2. The Wyoming State Fair, State 4-H Office, and UW County Extension Educators or staff are not responsible for the loss of or damage to any exhibit or animal.
3. It is the responsibility of 4-H youth to verify correct entry of their exhibits with their 4-H Educator.
4. Due to the absence of interview judging at the State Fair, the accompaniment of a brief explanation with your project may help the judge when assigning a ribbon placing. Points to consider may include: process, tools used, skills learned, goals achieved, additional help from others.
5. Because 4-H promotes a learning experience associated with project enrollment, entries are evaluated within the context of the division in which they are entered, i.e. entry in Leathercraft is evaluated on leathercraft skills.
6. Posters, pictures, artwork and photography exhibits should come with a method for hanging them on hooks attached to pegboard. If the items cannot be hung, they will be displayed on the floor or table.
7. Display boards or poster boards must be able to stand on their own on a table.
8. Any exhibit that puts the safety of others at risk of injury or harm, as deemed by the State 4-H Office, may not be allowed to be publicly displayed and/or judged.
9. Oversized exhibits will be displayed as space permits.
10. 4-H exhibits are placed as judged using the Danish system of recognition (purple, blue, red, white). Additional awards or recognition are available pending donor support.
11. All static exhibits must be in place in the 4-H Department by 5:00 PM on Monday, August 10.
12. Exhibits Released: All non-livestock and livestock exhibits will be released between 6:00 AM and 10:00 AM, Sunday, August 16. Fort Casper and Fort Reno buildings will be closed at 10:00 AM.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Foods & Nutrition - Prepared

1. Recipes are required with all entries. Recipes will not be returned and become the property of 4-H. Recipes must include the member's name, age, and county they are representing.
2. Only enter foods that can be safely stored at room temperature. Foods determined to be unsafe at room temperature will be disqualified with the decision of the judge being final. (Ex: do not enter cream pies, casseroles, or items with cream cheese frosting, etc.) Foods entered should be suitable for freezing prior to State Fair to aid in transportation to State Fair.
3. Judges may or may not choose to open, taste, cut, handle, etc., any entry.
4. Judges will negatively evaluate entries using commercial cake or bread mixes or those with wrappers (cupcakes, muffins, etc.).
5. Exhibit on 6-inch or smaller, plastic-coated or Styrofoam plate when possible. When smaller items are exhibited (rolls, cookies, biscuits, etc.), enter 3 items for each class.
6. When single items are exhibited (cakes, loaves, etc.), enter one fourth of the item. Breads should be displayed as an end-cut, cut from top crust through bottom crust.

Foods & Nutrition - Preserved

1. Recipes are required with all entries. Recipes will not be returned and become the property of 4-H. Recipes must include the member's name, age, and county they are representing.
2. All exhibits must include:
 - a) Product name
 - b) Processing method (boiling water or pressure)
 - c) If pressure, list pounds of pressure
 - d) Processing time
 - e) Altitude where product was processed
 - f) Style of packing (raw or hot)
 - g) Source of recipe
 - h) Drying process and internal temperature (for jerky)
3. Due to potential hazards of food-borne illness, judges may or may not choose to open, taste, unseal, handle, etc., any entry.
4. Clear, clean standard (usually half-pint, pint, or quart) Mason home canning jars in good condition with two-piece metal canning lids (flat lid and band) must be used. Regular or wide-mouth styles may be used.
5. All entries will be initially evaluated based on meeting current food safety guidelines from USDA and current UW publications found at <https://food.unl.edu/Youth/4-H-foods-judging-guide.pdf> & <https://uwyoextension.org/uwnutrition/category/food-preservation/>

Gardening & Horticulture

1. Entries must have been exhibited at the respective county fair and have been designated eligible for state fair entry. Example: If an entry of leaf lettuce got a purple placing at the county fair, an exhibitor may enter a new/fresh leaf lettuce entry in the Wyoming State Fair.
2. Superintendent will have the authority to dispose of entries which have begun to spoil before the end of fair. Exhibitors will still receive their ribbons and awards.
3. See Open Class Vegetable and Fruit Division for suggested number of items per entry.

Photography - All

1. Exhibits shall be mounted securely on a stiff mounting board or foam board.
2. Posters, pictures, artwork and photography exhibits must come with a method for hanging from hooks on pegboard.
3. No breakable glass allowed – use of Plexiglas or shrink plastic is allowed.

Photography - Digital Creations

1. Exhibits are created from an existing photograph that have been digitally altered to change the original content resulting in a new and unique piece.
2. This category is not intended for enhanced photographs such as removing red-eye, adding a border, adjusting color or shading, etc.

Quilting - All

1. Each exhibit may include historical information about the skill exhibited.
2. A quilt must be made up of 3 parts: Top (pieced, panels, whole cloth), Middle (batting, blanket, flannel, etc.), and Back (whole or pieced fabric).
3. Quilting methods include: Machine (either domestic or longarm), Hand, or Tied.
4. If no quilting method is used, the item should not be entered as a quilting project exhibit. For example, a duvet cover with no quilting would be more appropriately entered in the Interior Design division or, if using sewing techniques, the Fabric and Fashion division.

Self-Determined

1. All self-determined projects must have a completed approval form on file with the State 4-H Office before fair.
2. Each exhibit in the Self-Determined area should be accompanied by an information sheet indicating:
 - a) Topic selected
 - b) Goals to be achieved
 - c) How the project was carried out
 - d) Accomplishments
3. No live animal or insect exhibits will be accepted.

4-H Showmanship Contests

DIVISION 1879

- Any Junior, Intermediate, or Senior 4-H youth that is enrolled in the 4-H project of species that they intend to compete with are eligible.
- Previous winners of state contests are eligible to compete and win multiple years.
- Showmanship contestants must compete with their own animals.
- No boars, bulls, bucks (goats), or stallions will be allowed to compete in Showmanship. No lactating animals should be shown.
- Judging is based on the exhibitors' ability to present their animal for evaluation including the movement and positions of the animal, as well as the condition and cleanliness of the animal. Mannerisms, conduct of the contestant, and industry knowledge may also be considered by the judges in placings.
- For contest times and locations, refer to the species schedules in this book from pages 6 to 7.
- No premium money is offered for the 4-H Showmanship State Contests.

The use of non-approved or improper use of approved medications, drugs, chemical substances, or feed additives is strictly prohibited. Similarly, unethical fitting, tampering with or sabotage of animals is strictly prohibited.

CERTIFICATION AND STATEMENT OF DISCLOSURE

This certifies that the exhibitor/family agrees to abide by the rules of competition in the Wyoming State Fair Premium Book and to comply with the proper labeled use of medications, drugs, chemical substances, and feed additives as required under the USDA Wholesome Meat Act, and the quality assurance requirements of the WSF. The exhibitor/family agrees that non-compliance can result in civil and/or criminal liability.

The exhibitor/family agrees not to engage in unethical fitting practices, tampering, or sabotage and to use proper animal husbandry techniques and practices to become a better steward of their project(s). The exhibitor is responsible for:

- ✓ The proper care and treatment of his or her animals.
- ✓ The production of wholesome foods.
- ✓ The development of sound moral character in himself or herself and others.

The exhibitor/family agrees that any medication, drug, chemical substance, or feed additive administered to any market animal on the Wyoming State Fairgrounds will be administered by or under the direct supervision of a licensed veterinarian. The exhibitor/family understands that any medication that has not met the required withdrawal time may result in disqualification from the Wyoming State Fair.

The exhibitor/family acknowledges that the WSF reserves the right to examine, inspect, and test any market animal for medications, drugs, chemical substances, feed additives, and injections of any nature and to take any action deemed appropriate, including forfeiture of awards, if testing results show any positive residues exceeding FDA, EPA, or USDA established tolerance for any foreign substance including medications, drugs, pesticides, feed additives or chemicals.

We, the undersigned, further certify that the market animal listed above has not been administered any non-approved medication, drug, chemical substance, or feed additive and that we have adhered to the withdrawal time required for all approved drugs or medications.
